Who Should Become an Academic Advocate?

ISACA allows two faculty members* per functional discipline, such as MIS, or Information Security, Accounting and Audit, Enterprise Governance (including IT/IS), Executive Masters programs in Business and specialist Finance degree courses—at universities and colleges offering degree courses in the areas outlined.

*The faculty member is expected to be a full-time, or a recognized adjunct instructor, but special exceptions can be authorized by the university.
